Together, we bring hope.



# Together, we are letting children learn in Bougainville

magine if you weren't able to finish high school? Not because you couldn't do the work, but because there just wasn't one for you to physically attend?

That's the reality for many students in Bougainville, Papua New Guinea.

There are currently only four senior secondary schools in the whole of Bougainville, offering around 500 positions for an estimated age cohort of several thousand.

That means just 1 in 4 children will reach senior secondary school due to the scarcity of schools.

This is a situation AMS is currently striving to change. The aim of our recent mid-year appeal, Let Children Learn, was to fund the expansion of St Joseph's College in Bougainville. We're excited to share that we met our fundraising target!

Thank you to all the AMS supporters who generously donated to this appeal.

At present St Joseph's, situated in the town of Mabiri, only operates until Grade 10.

This is a critical time for Bougainville, which is on the path towards independence from Papua New Guinea. The urgent expansion of the education sector is crucial to

empower today's youth who will become tomorrow's leaders.

By expanding St Joseph's to provide senior secondary education plus boarding for young people in Bougainville, students will be able to complete their full education.

AMS has a strong history of delivering important educational projects in Bougainville. The Marist Brothers first established St Joseph's College in the village of Rigu in 1949, having been in Bougainville since 1941.

During the Bougainville conflict the school was burnt to the ground along with most buildings on the island. In 1999 the Marist Brothers established a new St Joseph's College in the village of Mabiri.

The new St Joseph's was purposely developed to educate excombatants and other young men of the crisis generation. Marist Brothers were at the forefront of peace and reconciliation efforts in the area, pioneered by Australian Brother Pat Howley who facilitated reconciliation through restorative justice practices.

This project involves the construction of a "4-1 building" - a two-storey building with two classrooms on the ground level and a dormitory on the upper level.

One classroom will be for 40 grade 11 students, the other classroom for 40 grade 12 students, while the dormitory will have a capacity of 20 students.

Once this project is completed there are still a number of important things to do at St Joseph's, so please do let us know if you are interested in continuing to support the young people of Bougainville in the future.

## Beef stew with Asian spices



#### Serves 4 **Ingredients**

#### For the marinade

- 1 kg of beef (the best cuts for this dish are chuck, cross-cut shanks, or fatty brisket)
- 3 tsps of salt
- 2 tsps of brown sugar
- 2 tsps of five-spice powder

Cut the beef in bite-sized cubes and marinate it with all the ingredients above for at least half a day. Marinating it overnight in the fridge would be ideal.



#### For the stew

- 500 g of chopped tomatoes
- 1 medium onion chopped
- · 4 cloves of garlic peeled and chopped into small pieces
- 2 tbsps of unsalted butter
- 2 or 3 bay leaves
- Salt and pepper
- 3-4 carrots peeled and cut into one-inch chunks
- · Potatoes: you can use baby potatoes, or just regular potatoes peeled and cut into chunks
- 1 tbsp of tomato paste
- 1-2 tsps of five-spice powder
- Fresh coriander (alternatively you can use parsley) chopped into

#### Step 1

Add butter to the pot over medium heat and, when it melts, add the chopped onion, and let it cook for a few minutes, then add the tomatoes. When the tomatoes are soft, put the beef and garlic in the pot. Cook over medium-high heat until the beef turns brown.

#### Step 2

Pour enough hot water into the pot to nearly cover the beef, add the bay leaves, 2 or 3 stars of star anise, five-spice powder, and the tomato paste. Reduce the heat to medium low, then simmer for 30-40 mins before adding the chopped carrots and potatoes.

#### Step 3

Cook for 15-20 mins, then check if the beef is tender and all the ingredients are cooked. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

reflections within a context of Marist
Motherhood (and Manhood) both
global and local and the enduring

of the projects in which AMS has
been involved and which we will be
supporting – providing sanctuary
for the children of sex-workers in
Balay Banaag in The Philippines;
schooling at St Joseph's College



Mabiri on previously strife-torn
Bougainville; St Marcellin School
and Hostel which provides free
education for the children of workers
in the tea gardens of Bangladesh;
Chetana Tribal Boy Hostel which
provides schooling for sons of poor
farming families belonging to ethnic
minorities in India; the women's
sewing project in Myanmar; and
teacher education in Timor-Leste.
Bec situated the work of AMS

within the broader context of the challenges we face in our own culture and society – COVID19,

drought, Black deaths in custody, sexual abuse and the issue of consent, to name some. And made sure to remind us of the humble but inspired origins of our Marist identity that we strive to remain faithful to at Marist College Ashgrove.

## **ICFP** | Timor-Leste

COVID-19 resurgence in the country has led to a difficult time for students in Timor-Leste over the past few months. Schools continue to be shut due to restrictions.

The Instituto Católico para Formação de Professores, or ICFP, is the Marist-administered teacher training college in Baucau, Timor-Leste. AMS has been involved with ICFP since it was established.

ICFP Deputy Director Domingas came up with an innovative

solution for the teaching practicum component of the course. As school attendance wasn't possible, he suggested asking teaching students to gather pupils around their homes to teach for the practicum period. Domingas organised this a video showcasing this, which is available on YouTube at

There is a severe shortage of building materials in the Pacific region currently, due to problems with transport, supply, and COVID-19 movement restrictions.

## LaValla Project | Cambodia

espite a promising start with schools reopening in in January in Cambodia, a COVID-19 resurgence in February put the country back into lockdown and schools remain shut. Unfortunately, the virus outbreak is much more serious than any in 2020.

#### **Online learning**

Many schools are providing online lessons to their students but LaValla students, being from very poor rural families, have no ability to access these lessons due to cost and isolation. Recently the school was told that if the Grade 12 students did not begin to join classes, they would not be allowed to sit for their senior exams later in the year.

The school is looking at ways to overcome this disadvantage and have decided to provide phones, initially to Grades 12, 9 and 6, the examination classes, and possibly extend this to other students if there is no sign of schools reopening soon. As well as the phones, costs

for phone charges also have to be covered. The project is now sourcing funds for this.

#### **Food support**

During 2020 staff surveyed families and found that many needed assistance with basic food supplies as many places of employment had closed due to the pandemic. LaValla initially distributed food to 50 of its families and will do this again once travel restrictions are lifted. The plan is to put together food packages worth about US\$60 and distribute them to the families, to 120 in total this time.









## Centru Tinamentu Uai-Lili (CTUF) | Timor-Leste

n some very good news:
restrictions were lifted around
the Uai Lili area in Baucau at the
beginning of June, allowing for the
gathering of crowds. So, computer
education classes for rural children
at CTUF have been able to resume.
We just received this image from our
project partners – and are delighted
to see how happy the children look!



## Blue Dragon | Vietnam

lue Dragon Children's
Foundation helps young people
and families in Vietnam survive
human trafficking and build new
lives. Being freed from oppression
is just the beginning for trauma
survivors, so the foundation provides
psychological support and health
care; access to education, career
preparation and vocational training;
and assistance for children to reunite
with their families.

During the past six months, support by AMS and Lenity Australia have enabled eight teenagers and young women to start vocational training courses; eight more have attended school; and two young women have found new jobs. The support has also allowed 84 survivors of trafficking to receive emergency care and accommodation after being rescued.

During a recent therapeutic activity, the girls drew a tree to hang their wishes for the future. Eighteen-yearold Chu shared: "I may not always shine, but I always walk towards the sun. My tree is small, but it is resilient and can withstand rain and storms."



## St Louis High School | Kiribati

hase 2 is underway!

We are thrilled to report that the second stage of our work at St Louis High School in Kiribati is progressing well, with the construction of new senior school toilet blocks now completed.

This project was the focus of our Schools Campaign in 2020 and in September we reported on the opening of the junior school toilet blocks.

After a slight delay due to COVID and material sourcing, work is now back on track. The next step will be

a new administration block. Thanks to all our schools who supported this campaign!



# Kuya Centre for Street Children | Philippines

April. The Kuya Centre supports
vulnerable children in the Philippines
to transition from the streets into

The Board of Trustees for Kuya

Fatima has many years of experience
working with children in need of
special care and protection both in
the Philippines and abroad.

We look forward to working with Fatima in her new role and continuing our involvement with this important project.



# Our Lady Queen of Martyrs | Solomon Islands

e were absolutely thrilled to receive this photo in April showing the materials for six new classrooms at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs officially arriving in Wainoni Bay!

Due to the remote location of the school and the recent bad weather, there was a delay in shipping the materials from Honiara.

This project is being supported by AMS in partnership with Catholic Mission.

We also spoke recently with some local community members who are working on the construction site.

Site foreman Michael said he was enjoying being able to work in his home village rather than travelling to Honiara.

"I am really enjoying the job – it's a challenge. This is a very big building.

I can also train local people, so they develop new skills," he said.

"It also has let me live at home, instead of working away in Honiara. It can be difficult to get home when you are working in town. But now I can spend my weekend going to see my family.

"My family is really happy to have me home – I get to sleep there at night. I have six children – five sons and one daughter. I am also a grandfather."

## **GOVERNANCE**

## **Board update**

he AMS Board met in April and again in mid June and considered a number of matters, including the following:

The Board presented its **2020 Annual Report** to its members, the Marist Brothers Province of Australia at the May Annual General Meeting.

AMS Directors continue to monitor progress against the **2021 budget** and are pleased that income and expenditure are largely as anticipated so far this year.

Following review from the Finance and Risk Committee, the Board has approved updates to the following policies: Counter-Terrorism Policy; Risk Management Policy; Investment Policy; Fundraising and Donations Policy; and Delegations of Authority Policy and Schedule.

AMS Directors welcomed new staff members Nigel Sydney (Projects Coordinator) and Christopher Boevink (Marketing and Design Officer) to the organisation.

The Board received updates on the situation facing several **AMS project partner countries** in the region, including Fiji, Myanmar, India, Bangladesh, Cambodia and Timor-Leste and continues to keep an eye on the challenges facing many of AMS' partner communities.

AMS Directors continued to participate in 'deep dive' discussions as part of the **strategic planning process**, considering matters

including the breadth and depth of the current project portfolio, AMS' relationships with a variety of Marist family agencies and new communications and fundraising strategies.

The Board checked in with the **AMS Risk Register** and was pleased to report that a cyber-security insurance policy for the organisation has been put in place.

The Board approved new Communications and Fundraising strategies for the organisation.

The Board also wished CEO Bec Bromhead well as she starts a period of parental leave and welcomed Deirdre Looney as Acting CEO until the end of 2021.

## **Operations update**

While it seems that the AMS staff team is growing exponentially, actually it has only increased by half a full-time position, but there are now lots of part-time staff working in the office. This brings a wide variety of specialist expertise to the team, which is wonderful, but does mean that you won't always be able to catch every staff member on every day. In May the team spent **two days offsite** sharing skills from the
different portfolios and planning for
the current year. It was an energizing

It has been wonderful to connect face to face with AMS friends and supporters recently in Adelaide and Sydney. Special thanks to Parramatta Marist High School, St Joseph's College Hunters Hill and Sacred Heart College Adelaide for your generosity in hosting our gatherings. AMS looks forward to connecting in person (restrictions allowing) with friends in Melbourne and Brisbane in November this year.

The AMS team worked hard to present the mid year 'Let Children Learn' Appeal, gathering support to provide access to senior secondary education at St Joseph's College in Mabiri, Bougainville. You can read more about this inspiring work on page 4.

While it is not the most exciting thing to talk about, one of the most important things the AMS team is currently working on is improving our records management systems in the office. There are upgrades that need to be done over the coming six to 12 months and the team is excited that this will allow them to work more efficiently and effectively, ultimately over time enabling us to send even more resources to our partners.

## **60 SECONDS WITH**

## **Brother Jeff Barrington, AMS Board**

How did you come to know about/connect with AMS?

A. I was there at the start. In 2004 Br Chris Wills came to live with me at Rosalie and began the MAPS organisation, setting up the office there and developing programs, as well as communicating with and connecting with schools. Br Allen Sherry had just recently returned from Rome and sometime later joined Chris at Rosalie, to combine the work he had begun in Melbourne. Soon after, Br Chris went to Rome and Br Allen continued their work forming and establishing AMS. I moved to Emerald for five years and then six at John Therry Catholic School at Rosemeadow. During that time a strong connection between AMS and Marist schools developed, and thus, I stayed connected.

**Q.** What aspect of work of AMS are you most passionate about?

A. There are two areas that I see are important and am passionate about in AMS. Sorry, I can't pick one because they go together. One is supporting, developing, resourcing, and educating, those young people who have very little in various places around the world. Therefore, the outreach programs are critically important.
